Royal Dornoch **Par 70** 6595 yards

The Struie **Par 72** 6276 yards

Royal Dornoch's second course the Struie, although shorter than its older neighbour, is a fine test of golf requiring accurate shot making. As with most links, it is flat and easy to walk around but the generous fairways make it an enjoyable test of Golf. A fine course for beginners or the more experienced alike.

Tain **Par 70** 6404 yards

The layout of Tain Golf Club's course is the work of Old Tom Morris. The wonderful views of sea and mountains add to the pleasure of playing on a traditional links that boasts many testing holes including the 3rd which has been rated as one of the best 18 holes in the British Isles and the 17th acknowledged as the best short hole ever designed by Old Tom Morris.

Set at the foot of Ben Bhraggie, Golspie Golf Club offers one of the finest settings for a round of golf. Designed by the legendary James Braid the course offers a unique blend of seaside links, heath and parkland golf and is a refreshing challenge to all abilities of golfer.



History & Heritage

The Dornoch Firth Golf Courses represent all that's wonderful about Scottish Links Golf design. Brora and Golspie were design by James Braid, Tom Morris was responsible for Tain and Dornoch is the home of Donald Ross.


James Braid

Braid was born in Fife and played golf from an early age, working as a clubmaker before turning professional in 1896. He won The Open Championship five times. In 1912, Braid retired from tournament golf and became a club professional at Walton Heath. He was involved in golf course design, and is sometimes regarded as the "inventor" of the dogleg. As well as his role in the development of both Brora and Golspie, among his designs are both the "King's" and the "Queen's" at Gleneagles, and the remodelling of Carnoustie as well.



Old Tom Morris


Old Tom Morris was born in St Andrews in 1821 and played a role in designing courses across the British Isles. He began by assisting at Carnoustie in 1842 and his subsequent work included Prestwick, Muirfield, the Jubilee Course at St Andrews and Tain on the Dornoch Firth



He introduced the concept of top-dressing greens with sand, was the first to use a push mower to cut greens, and standardised the golf course to 18 holes. He was also influential in the launch of The Open Championship in 1860, and struck the very first shot in that event at Prestwick and remained active until his death in his home town aged 86

Donald Ross

By the time he died in 1948, Scotsman Donald Ross left behind a legacy of 413 courses, including Pinehurst No. 2 in North Carolina and the site of the 1996 U.S. Open, Oakland Hills outside Detroit. Ross was born in 1872 in Dornoch. As a young man he took up "the keeping of the green." After a year of apprenticeship at St. Andrews under the tutelage of 4-time British Open champion "Old" Tom Morris, he returned to his native Dornoch and became adept not only at maintaining the grounds but also as a player and club maker. The rest is history...
